Michigan Public Act 511, also known as the Community Corrections Act, was established in 1988 in an effort to improve the State's prison commitment rates (PCR) through the development and utilization of evidence-based, community corrections programming that targets moderate to high risk/needs offenders. Counties and regions establishing a Community Corrections Advisory Board (CCAB) appoint member stakeholders as required by PA-511 to identify and target local criminogenic needs that impact prison commitments and recidivism. 3. ANALYSIS

- a. <u>For returning applicants:</u> Did you meet your Key Objectives for the previous two fiscal years? Yes If not, please provide an analysis of why: 2 of the 4 objectives were met. Objectives 2 and 4 were met. The number of probation violators sent to prison on a violation was 8, remaining under 10 and the public safety rate for pretrial clients was 98% over the 90% projection. Objectives 1 and 3 were not met. The overall PCR increased to 14.6% and the FTA rate for pretrial individual was at 12% just over the 10% target.
- b. For all applicants: Please provide information/local data to explain any changes in PCRs and dispositions. If requesting programming for specific populations (examples: OUIL-3rds, delayed/deferred sentences, prison diversion, pretrial, etc.) please provide supportive data analyses for these populations, including any additional pertinent information necessary to establish trends: In 2021, Washtenaw County courts and the MDOC Field office were still operating under COVID restrictions, monitoring, and reduced operations. In FY 2022 there was an increase total dispotions by 100 as court operations began to normalize. Also in FY 2022 22nd CC and the MDOC Field office resumed more normal operations. Therefore, more cases were seen and monitoring increased. Pretrial Services in Washtenaw County exploded as an alternative to detention. Both pretrial supervision and the use of pretrial EM significantly increased to numbers higher than before the pandemic. Local reform efforts system wide have encouraged the use of these programs in lieu of incarceration. As a community we did see an increase in violent crime which led to more prison sentencings based on the nature of the offense.

1. ANALYSIS

a. <u>For all applicants:</u> Please provide information/local data to explain any changes in Probation Violator data, including prison and non-prison dispositions: In FY 2021 there were only 4 probation violators sent to prison. This is an extremely low number. In 2021, Washtenaw County courts and the MDOC Field office were still operating under COVID restrictions, monitoring, and reduced operations. In FY 2022 there was an increase to 15 total probation violators sent to prison. All but 3 of these was for a new offense. There was only 1 technical violator indicating that Field Agents are using alternatives for technical violations. In FY 2022 22nd CC and the MDOC Field office resumed more normal operations. Therefore, more cases have been seen and monitoring has increased. Overall, 8 is still a relatively small number of probation violations resulting in a prison sentence.

D: COMPAS CRIMINOGENIC NEEDS PROFILE

1. Substance Use - We have expanded our substance use treatment model using multi level of care, peer supports, MAT in jail and community. We moved to gender specific and truama informed programming models. We have a BHS program to support connections to SUD and MH servcies. Nalaxone is available in the jail and in the community. We've added reentry case managers to the WCSO to help support successful transitions and reduce recedivism. WCSO has a fully functioning reentry services division which operates in includes a sustainable the jail and in the community and also housing model. 2. Criminal Thinking/Social Support - MRT and expanded Peer to Peer services. ITR Outreach program is fully operational. Peer to peer model in Street Outreach. We've added additional groups to increase capacity. Expanded partnership and services with local CMH with an increased focus on behavioral health issues for those involved in the justice system. Added Behavioral Health Specialist positon which is now full time. We are rquesting funding to add TREM Women's trauma and support recovery. Anger Management program is available for all probationers. We've added reentry case managers to the WCSO to help support successful transitions and reduce recedivism. WCSO has a fully functioning reentry services division which operates in the jail and in the community and also includes a sustainable housing model.

2. 3. Vocational/Education. Community Corrections has a partnership with Washtenaw Community College to provide vocational certificates at no cost to probationers. Remedial and adult education classes are coordinated for those not yet ready to enroll in a voc certificate course. The WCSO has a partnership with the Washtenaw Intermediate School District to prodivde a full array of education services. High school completion, High Shool Diploma, Adulte Basic Ed, GED, and Special Education Services are avaibale. WCSO also contracts with Skill and Abilities to provide workforc development and job placement. We've added reentry case managers to the WCSO to help support successful transitions and reduce recedivism. WCSO has a fully functioning reentry services division which operates in the jail and in the community and also includes a sustainable housing model.

E: LOCAL PRACTICES TO ADDRESS PERSONS WITH SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER(S)

1. How do defendants and offenders get screened for substance use services in your area (regardless of funding source)? **Probationers and pretrial participants, both district and circuit court are screened by the probation**

agent or pretrial agent using a COMPAS (MDOC) or individual department screens (MAST/DAST - distrcit courts). MDOC COMPAS and DAST- A moderate to high risk score in substance use and related areas will trigger a referral to SUD assessment.

- 2. How do defendants and offenders get referred for a substance use assessment and subsequent appropriate ASAM Level of Care in your area (regardless of funding source)? All probationers and pretrial participants (both distrcit and circuit courts) who are screened for SUD and score moderate to high are referred to Community Corrections for an SUD assessment and SUD programming, if deemed an appropriate level of care. Residential and MAT program referrals are made direct to PIHP from the probation agents.
- 3. Are there any barriers or gaps in service to obtaining an assessment and treatment that your CCAB is requesting OCC funding to fill? Yes. The local PIHP does not have the resources to support the probationers of Washtenaw County and the significnat need for SUD assesments and services, nor do the local SUD providers have the resources to support the numbers of probationers per year. If so, please describe in detail: For over 16 years, Community Corrections has been the primary provider of outpatient SUD services to the probation populations of both the district and circuit courts in Washtenaw County through the Dawn Farm - CCOP program funded by MDOC -OCC. As such, all probationers in need of SUD asssessments and services are referred to Community Corrections and do not utilize the local access process for community outpatient SUD services. On average, between 500-600 probationers are provided SUD assessments and treament services through Community Corrections every year. Since there has been an SUD program specific for probationers in Washtenaw County for the last 16 years, our local PIHP and community SUD providers have built their resources, progrmas, and staffing without this specific populastion in mind. Our local PIHP and community providers are unable to meet the need of an annual increase over 500 persons per year for assessments or treatment services. An already underresourced service will not sustain such a substainal increase in referrals, and will result in much longer wait lists for access to treatment and an inability to meet the commuity need. This inability to service an additional 500 persons per year will negativiley impact the probation population and deny many more quick access to care.
- 4. What non-PA 511 funded services are available in your area? Be sure to include treatment court services. Washtenaw County has drug treatment courts at both the disctrict and circuit level as well as a sobriety court which focuses on drug and alcohol related charges. Washtenaw County also has a Mental Health and Veteran's Court. All of these specialty courts are funded by SCAO and adhere to the treatment requirements of those grant funded programs. CARES, CRU, and LEADD all funded through the Public Safety and Mental Health Millage.

F: COMPREHENSIVE CORRECTIONS PLAN SUMMARY

- Please explain how the Comprehensive Corrections Plan, in coordination with the local practices, will impact 1. the State Board Priorities, and ultimately offender success: Washtenaw County continues to target root cause issues to crime, poverty, public health, and recidivism. The CCAB plan provides the resources and support for those involved in the criminal justice system, and our community partners provide resources and support to to all citizens. The Washtenaw County Sheriff's Office is committed to building strong and sustainable communities through programs such as Community Engagement, Street Outreach, Total Policing, Community Corrections and Reentry. Community Corrections is part of the Sheriff's Office in Washtenaw County therefore, our strategies and those of the Sheriff's Office are on in the same. Many community initiatives exist through WCSO. Jail Reentry, Peer to Peer mentorship, Street Outreach, New Beginnings warrant amnesty court, CORE and LEADD program, and County Diversion Council to name only a few. In 2018 Washtenaw County passed a public safety and mental health millage to support the diversion, treament, and coordination of care/service to these two entities. WCSO and CMH have developed a solid partnership that focuses on root cause, harm reduction, and behavioral health within the community. Through the millage CARES, CRU, and CVIT have been created. The County has spoken that this population is a priority, the needs are great, and the WCSO and CMH have the ability and expertise to improve quality of life and decrease stigma and incarceration rates amongst this population. These initiatives all support the oveall priorities of the State as they are designed to impact crime, recidivism, health, and overall quality of life.
- 2. What steps will you take if you find that you are not meeting your objectives, or your strategies are not being implemented as planned? We will continue to communicate regularly with the MDOC Field Office and the

local Judiciary. Special meetings with the key stakeholders to provide educational direction on alternative sanctions/services will continue on a regular basis. We will meet with the Judiciary regarding the impact to the system as a whole (encouraging a systems approach). We will review OMNI data when available. CCIS reports will be reviewed for monthly program participation.

III. TARGETING CRIMINOGENIC NEEDS OF LOCAL OFFENDERS

Utilizing COMPAS Criminogenic Needs Data provided by MDOC for FY 2022, the County/Region identifies the following Top 3 Criminogenic Needs among felony probationers:

- 1. Substance Abuse
- 2. Criminal Thinking/Social Support



3. Education/Vocational

The programs intended to impact these needs are as follows: MRT and expanded services, ITR Outreach program, peer to peer model in Street Outreach and Anger Management. Expanded partnership and services with local CMH with an increased focus on behavioral health issues for those involved in the justice system and added Behavioral Health Specialist position, which is now full time. Additionally, the county is requesting funding to add TREM Women's trauma and support recovery. Community corrections in Washtenaw County has expanded their substance use treatment model using multi-level of care, peer supports, and MAT in jail and community. Gender-specific and trauma informed programming models are available to all. Nalaxone and MAT programs are operational in the jail and in community for those in need. Community Corrections has a partnership with Washtenaw Community College to provide vocational certificates at no cost to probationers. Remedial and adult education classes are coordinated for those not yet ready to enroll in a voc-certificate course. The WCSO has a partnership with the Washtenaw Intermediate School District to provide a full array of education services, such as High school completion, High School Diploma, Adult Basic Ed, GED, and Special Education Services. WCSO also contracts with Skill and Abilities to provide workforce development and job placement. Reentry case managers have been added to the WCSO to help support successful transitions and reduce recidivism. WCSO has a fully functioning reentry services division which operates in the jail and in the community and includes a sustainable housing model.

IV. STATE OFFICE OF COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS ASSESSMENT

A. CCAB Comprehensive Corrections Plan – Impact Analysis and Recommendations

The comprehensive plan continues to emphasize pretrial services, cognitive behavioral programming, and substance use programs, which target probation violators and sentenced felons. The County's plan addresses its three (3) highest COMPAS criminogenic needs: Criminal Thinking/Social Supports, Substance abuse, and Vocational/education through community corrections programming. The County puts a strong emphasis on evidence-based programming through the utilization of appropriate assessments and meets the needs of the justice-involved population through applicable responsivity. The proposed programs are strategies that will continue to encourage structured sentencing options that avoid both prison and lengthy jail terms. The continued decrease in PCRs and recidivism can be attributed to the addition of programs targeting local needs, the expansion of highly utilized programming to include more availability and multi-level care as well as gender-responsive programming using trauma-informed practices.

The County is seeking additional funding to leverage a local Batterers Intervention program. In the past, probationers have utilized a local provider, who charges \$50/week for 52 weeks, and many fell behind due to arrearages and could not complete the program per court/probation orders. To remedy this issue, the County worked with Kalamazoo to participate in the free virtual programming in hopes of filling the gap in service for FY 2024. An increase in utilization of electronic monitoring and pretrial supervision has led to a request for additional funding as well. It is recommended the State Board conditionally approve Washtenaw County's FY 2023 comprehensive plan.

B. Contractual Conditions

• FY 2024 recommended CPS award: \$815,269. The total administration line item cannot exceed 30% of the total award- \$815,269. The County must submit a revised budget document at the time of the submission of the signed contract indicating the funding allocation per line item for the following programs: Administration,



(C01) MRT, (D08) Prep Electronic Monitoring, (F22) Pretrial Screening, (F23) Pretrial Services- PREP, (G18) Substance Use Outpatient & Jail, (I24) Behavioral Health Specialist, (Z00) Vocational Certificates, (Z00) Street Outreach, (Z00) TREM, and (C05) Batterers Intervention. If these changes impact your projected new enrollments, the County must submit revised enrollment information to your assigned Community Corrections Specialist for review and approval.
